Any member of the Naval Reserve whose record and marks fulfill the requirements prescribed for the Fleet Navy are eligible and may be recommended for good conduct awards after each three year period of continuous active service served in time of national emergency and of war.

He must have marks in proficiency in rating at least 3.5 and no offenses or qualifying remarks in his record.


